Twin Cities' Beauties Compete For Title Of 'Miss California'

Two local college students—Jonelle Johnson of Marysville and Charlotte Stewart of Yuba City—will be engaged in beauty contests later this month. Jonelle as the Marysville-Yuba City entrant in the Miss California pageant at Santa Cruz and Charlotte in the Miss California contest in Burbank.

Jonelle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Clifford Johnson, Sr., 2103 Sampson St., Marysville, is a native of Marysville and an honor student at Brigham Young University. She was Miss Yuba-Sutter in 1957 and went on to be one of the 10 maidens in the Maid of California contest at the State Fair in Sacramento.

She is the first Marysville-Yuba City beauty to be entered in the Miss California pageant—a Miss America preliminary—and her talent presentation will be a dramatic reading. The pageant is scheduled for June 25 through 28.

At BYU, the brunette is a song leader, member of Cougarettos (a precision marching - dancing team), of Student Program Bureau, Sportswomen's Club and she is an affiliate of Cami Los Social unit.

Other beauty titles she has won include "Val Hicry Sweetheart" in 1958 at BYU; Miss Fashion Plate of 1956 for KLOE in Provo; Miss Tamahawk while a student at Marysville Union High School. She's an elementary education major, minoring in speech.

CHARLOTTE, DAUGHTER of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Stewart of Taylor Rd., Sutter county, will enter the Miss California contest in Burbank June 24 through 29. Winner of this division, sponsored by leading swim suit and cosmetics manufacturers, will compete at Burbank with 50 other preliminary winners for the honor of being Miss California at the July 18-25 fete in Long Beach. Yuba City will sponsor her Burbank stay, during which she will appear in evening gown and swim suit and be required to give a talk about her hometown. The judging, which will be televised June 26 and 27, is based on beauty, personality and special talents.

The 5' 5" 18 year-old blond, just completed her first year of dramatic training at the Pasadena Playhouse College of Theatre Arts, where she appeared on main stage in "The Time of Your Life" and in Balcony Theatre production of "Vaudeville, USA" and others. She has participated in local roller skating competition for the past 10 years.
