Two Arbuckle Women In Derby

Two Arbuckle women Mrs. Betty D. Haynes and Mrs. Nelsyne Jones, will be racing in the No. 25 position this year during the annual All Women Transcontinental Air Race, better known as the Powder Puff Derby. The race will start in Lawrence, Mass., on July 4 and all planes must reach the destination, Spokane Wash., by noon on July 8.

The team will fly a Piper Comanche PA-24.

Mrs. Haynes and Mrs. Jones between them have approximately 1,000 hours of flying time. Both are members of the Ninety-Nines, Inc., which is the international organization of licensed pilots.

Mrs. Haynes is vice-president of the organization in California.

She also is guest of the Flying Farmers of California and acts as their official hostess.

THIS YEAR'S race, flown during daylight hours, takes the most northerly route with "must" stops at Kokomo, Ind., Fargo, N. D., and Helena, Mont. In each of these places the planes are checked in for official recordings.

Each make and model of plane has a par speed handicap, and the winner will be that aircraft which averages the highest ground speed in relation to its par speed. Each contestant is racing against her own handicap, so no winners can be determined until all aircraft have finished the race. The first aircraft across the finish line is not necessarily the winner.

The non-profit organization of women, which was formed in 1930, each year conducts the Powder Puff Derby "to promote air education, to develop higher degrees of skill in the art of flying, and to encourage acceptance, by the public, of private aviation as a means of transportation."

THE WOMEN'S board of directors directs the activities of the race committees at the start and terminus, and along the race route. It also promotes financial assistance, sets the policies, writes the rules, publishes the handicaps, and performs all other tasks necessary to the running of the national sporting event.

"This is the most wonderful opportunity," said Mrs. Haynes. "We gain more experience in one race than we would get from many flying lessons and hours in the air. Also we get to meet women from all over the United States who are interested in flying. They range in age from teenagers to great-grandmothers and many are professionals."

The awards banquet is given the last night of the race when all planes are in.

Husbands of the Arbuckle women are being flown to Spokane for the event.

Live Oak Agencies Planning Session On Variance Issue

LIVE OAK—A combined meeting of the Live Oak City Council and the city planning commission will be held in the near future to decide the fate of an application for a permit to allow McDonald's Restaurant a variance from the city's three-foot setback regulation.

Restaurant owner Thomas McDonald had been asked to appear before the council to request personally the issuance of the variance permit on the setback ordinance as specified in the city code. He asked that the permit be issued for the west side of the new addition to his business establishment, which is nearing completion.

When Councilman Charlie Earnest demanded, "I'd like to see those plans (for the building)." They should be right here in the city hall and I want to see them here," McDonald agreed to bring them.

McDonald told the council that he had built up to the property line under a property-trading plan which had not worked out.

No second.

At this point, Earnest moved that the council abide by the planning commission's recommendation that no variance permit be granted to McDonald. Councilman James McElroy retorted, "Things are so mixed up that I don't want to second that."

When asked by Mayor William Stafford for a motion in the affirmative, Councilman George Pierce replied, "McDonald is a businessman in this town, and I'm going to make a motion we grant him a variance at this time."

Mayor Stafford seconded with a nod, and "I think he built that building in good faith and that he will bring the plans to the city hall."

The motion was defeated and Pierce demanded, "Then what are we going to do... make him tear the building down?"

Stafford retorted, "I know what I would have done if I were McDonald. I'd have moved that building right out of town."

It was decided to call an adjourned meeting with the Planning Commission present to solve the problem.
