
Melissa Gilbert sheds her *Little House* image and speaks candidly about work and love.



Wenty-four-year-old Melissa Gilbert knows all about leading a double life. On Sunday, Jan. 18, she stars in the NBC movie "Blood Vows: The Story of a Mafia Wife." In the film, she plays innocent bumpkin Marian Winslow, a woman who doesn't realize – until it's too late – that the man to whom she's married, lawyer Edward Moran (Joe Penny), is deeply involved with the Mafia.

Gilbert, who literally grew up playing Laura Ingalls Wilder on "Little House on the Prairie," is currently starring in much more than just a TV movie. Her rocky six-year romance with Brat Packer Rob Lowe has made her and Lowe on-going co-stars on the covers of supermarket tabloids. Will they or won't they? And with whom? Your romance with Rob Lowe has really put you in the public eye. How do you deal with all the publicity?

I don't know whether to laugh or cry. Right now it's exciting because I'll be walking down the street and someone will call out to me and say, "You're Melissa Gilbert. Congratulations. I heard about your engagement and I'm so happy for you." That keeps me laughing.

But certainly you didn't laugh at the stories about Rob Lowe and other women.


