HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - Off screen, Alison Arngrim, the spoiled kid you love to hate on "Little House on The Prairie," is a beautiful 16-year-old who is carving a career for herself as a stand-up comedienne.

Alison, a lovely and lively blonde, spends her Friday and Saturday nights breaking in her stand-up comedy act at small clubs in and around Hollywood. She's also cut a comedy album, "Here's Amy," an impression of presidential daughter Amy Carter.

As clever as she is fetching, Alison is looking forward to the day when she has her own bigtime nightclub act and television series.

Meanwhile, she is advancing her career in the role of Nellie Oleson, the arrogant little snob who gives the Ingalls family a rough time in the NBC-TV series.

Alison lives at home with her family. Papa Thor Arngrim is a talent manager. Her mother, known professionally as Norma Macmillan, does TV commercials and the voices for cartoon characters. Her brother, Stefan, 22. is a successful actor, too.

Stallone art work

Stefan has his own pad, but Alison lives with her parents in a Hollywood apartment house, complete with swimming pool. Her room is decorated a la early American teen-age mess, the most distinguishing feature of which is an abundance of Sylvester Stallone art work.

The walls are covered with posters and photographs and magazine pictures of the star of "Rocky" with whom Alison is unabashedly in love. Although she has never met Stallone. she has seen "Rocky" more times than she can count.

Her real life boyfriends are fellow students at Hollywood High School who don't seem to be intimidated by the fact that she is a blossoming television actress with plans to become a comedy star.

Alison helps out around the apartment, especially in the kitchen where she has taught herself to cook from cookbooks. Her father is the real chef of the family, but Alison goes out of her way to brag about her chicken

When "Little House on the Prairie" is on hiatus Alison attends 11th grade classes at Hollywood High. During the run of the show she studies with a tutor in a trailer at Paramount Studios with other youthful members of the class, Melissa Sue Anderson and Melissa Gilbert.

But Alison is in a hurry to put school behind her. "I plan on taking the California proficiency examination which is the equivalent of a diploma

so I can take college courses next year. That means I won't have to be tutored on the set.

Normal life Alison says she leads a normal teen-age life with a healthy interest

in junk foods, dates and clothes. She is considerably more mature than other girls her age and possessed of more poise than most females twice her age.

It takes courage to step up to a microphone in a club and go into a comedy routine. At first the customers don't know what to make of Alison or what to expect in the way of humor.

Her opening line sets the pace for her act: "I had my choice of playing this club or attending the Roman Polansky Daycare Center." The laugh is immediate and she goes on from

"I let the audience know right away I'm not going to do knock-knock jokes," Alison says with a wicked sni-

"I guess I'm the only professional 16-year-old comedian in the country. But I'm a fairly smart 16-year-

Because she appears in about half of the "Little House On The Prairie" episodes in a season, Alison has a flexible schedule. When the show is on location she usually arises at 5:30 to be ready to work at 8 a.m.

She likes to have dinner in fancy restaurants and go to movies on her dates, but her nightlife is considerably reduced by club work. Alison is more concerned with her career than romance.

Alison is addicted to blue jeans and torn T-shirts, some held together with safety pins in emulation of her punk rock heroines.

More than anything else, Alison is ambitious to become a star and, at the rate she's going, that day shouldn't be far off.

VIP treatment for home sellers grows CHICAGO (UPI) - People selling

their houses are more concerned with making a fair deal than in making a killing, a realty firm survey indicates.

The survey was made by Realty World, which has 600 members nationwide in a firm which went into a franchise operation two years ago.

Porterfield said the survey also showed a seller wants to spend as little time as possible with the broker, "but a buyer is willing to spend all the time the broker can afford to make sure the broker understands the buyer's precise needs.'

Business booming

Porterfield said house sellers who bought their homes seven or eight years ago probably will get twice what they paid for their houses in today's market, which he described as "booming."

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that brokers and consumers are getting a myriad of services unheard of four or five years ago."

The advent of national franchising in the real estate business has increased competition and resulted in scores of services to make selling or buying a house a near-science, Porterfield said.

One of the major new services offered by Realty World to its brokers and customers includes a free interior design consultation service.

"We provide a team of experts to inspect a home which is ready for sale and work out interior decorating changes which will make the home salable," Porterfield said.



With the bands, faculty members and students will perform acts ranging from acrobatics and dancing to playing the spoons.


